- ① **WE ARE ONE:** Play New Games (like group juggling!) that promote teamwork and unity with **Larry Hayes**.
- ② **1:00 ONLY ¡BAILA! SHARING THE RHYTHM:** Learn basic steps for traditional Latin dances such as salsa, merengue, bolero, cha-cha, cumbia, and more. *Shake it up!* (Limit 20)
- ③ **3:30 ONLY RAINFOREST JOURNEY:** Stories, songs, and dances from Latin America's tropical rainforests. Re-create a rainforest sound scene using instruments made with materials from the rainforests, such as wood, seeds, and pods, and instruments that imitate sounds of the rainforest...frogs, crickets, wind, and rain. Hear the story of the Puerto Rican tree frog (called *coqui*) and learn the "Coqui" song in English and Spanish. (Limit 20)

- ④ **FINS, FUR, AND SCALES:** Observe diverse critters you know and love from your own backyard, up close with **Sheila and Bryan Eyler**.
- ⑤ **SEEKING BALANCE:** Perform gentle yoga moves for kids in the Hindu tradition with **Jennifer Jones** (1:00) and **Mineca Wilson** (3:30).
- ⑥ **PADDLING TOGETHER:** Get a close-up look at streamside wonders while you paddle a wee stretch of our own Antietam Creek in a craft that originated with the early Eskimos. **Mr. Mike** will be your guide. (Bring water shoes, dry clothes and a towel for after your paddle.)
- ⑦ **GLOBAL GARB:** Create and display your own internationally attired paper doll at our clothesline exhibit. Materials supplied. Come have fun creating and sharing with the guidance of **Colleen Tidd**.
- ⑧ **JAPANESE CHERRY BLOSSOMS** represent spring and new beginnings. **Cheryl, Gabrielle, and Sierra Mankins** supply inspiration and materials to help you create a delicate work of Eastern art.
- ⑨ **TRIBAL FACES:** Craft an African mask with **Kathy Helfrick** and **Jane Glenn**. Learn how masks are used in traditional celebrations. Children around the world have varying customs, look different, and enjoy unique traditions, yet are alike in many ways. Celebrate the differences *and* the ways we're the same!
- ⑩ **STEP INTO THE STORY TENT:** Take a trek around the world with **Lori Milach** and **Heidi Moyer** from the Alexander Hamilton Memorial Library. Spin around the globe without ever leaving the tent!

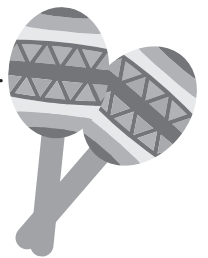
